

What is the ParentChild+ Program?

ParentChild+ is a **free** program that partners with families to help young children build the skills they need for school success.

A home visitor will visit your home twice each week to support you in engaging your child in play, conversation, and everyday learning activities that build language, learning, and confidence.



Each week, your family will receive a book or toy to keep, so you can continue using it together between visits.

We support you in strengthening everyday interactions that prepare your child for school by building on your family's routines, values, language, and cultural strength



Did You Know....?

You are your child's first and most important teacher.

Your home is your child's first classroom.

Children learn best through play, conversation, and shared activities.

Reading and talking with your child in your home language supports school readiness, brain development and better self-regulation.
